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1 2 ESTABLISHMENT OF AN OFFICE OF FORENSIC 3 SCIENCES AND A FORENSIC SCIENCE BOARD WITHIN 4 THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE 5 6 7 8 I. **DEFINITIONS.** 9 FORENSIC SCIENCE SERVICE PROVIDER—A forensic science agency or forensic 10 science practitioner providing forensic science services. 11 12 FORENSIC SCIENCE AGENCY—An organization in the public or private sector that employs forensic science practitioners and issues reports prepared by forensic science 13 practitioners. 14 FORENSIC SCIENCE PRACTITIONER—An individual who (1) applies scientific or 15 technical practices to the recognition, collection, analysis, or interpretation of evidence for 16 criminal and civil law or regulatory issues, and (2) issues test results, provides reports, or 17 provides interpretations, conclusions, or opinions through testimony with respect to such 18 19 evidence. 20 II. OFFICE OF FORENSIC SCIENCE. 21 22 (a) IN GENERAL—There is established within the Department of Justice, Office of Justice 23 Programs (OJP), an Office of Forensic Science (OFS), headed by a Director, appointed 24 by the President, who shall report to Attorney General through the Assistant Attorney 25 General for OJP. 26 27 28 There shall be transferred to the Office of Forensic Science the personnel, including contractors and interns, assets, liabilities, contracts, property, records, and unexpended 29 balance of appropriations, authorizations, allocations, and other funds employed, held, 30 31 used, arising from, available or to be made available, and the functions, powers, and duties of: 32 (1) the Office of Investigative Forensic Sciences within the National Institute of 33 Justice: 34 (2) the forensic components of the Drugs and Crime program in the Office of 35 Research and Evaluation within the National Institute of Justice; 36 37 (3) the digital evidence component of the Office of Science and Technology within the National Institute of Justice: 38 (4) the Wrongful Conviction Review Program within the Bureau of Justice 39 Assistance: and 40 (5) the National Sexual Assault Kit Initiative (SAKI) within the Bureau of Justice 41 Assistance. 42

44	The Office of Forensic Science is designated as a law enforcement agency for purposes
45	of accessing and searching federal law enforcement databases and shall have assigned
46	to it an Originating Agency Identification (ORI) Number to facilitate the sharing of
47	information between the Office and other law enforcement agencies.

50	the use of forensic science within the judicial system by supporting forensic science

54	building for the forensic infrastructure.

56	(c) OFFICERS AND STAFF —
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58	(1) IN GENERAL—The Office shall include—
59	(A) a Director

91	General for OJP, in consultation with the Director and Deputy Director of
92	OFS, determines appropriate;

94	(E) the OFS may also include employees of the National Institute of
95	Standards and Technology (NIST), the National Science Foundation (NSF),
96	and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) detailed to the Office
97	of Forensic Science on a reimbursable basis.

99	(f) DEADLINE—Not later than 180 days after the date of enactment of this Act the
100	transition to the OFS of the offices, programs and initiatives named in II.(a)(1) through
101	(a)(5) and the initial appointments, selections, and detailing under paragraph II.(c) shall
102	be completed.

104	(g) VACANCY—In the event of a vacancy in the position of Director—

107	(h) LIAISON— If no detailed positions are filled under paragraph II.(c)(1)(E) above, the
108	Directors of the National Science Foundation (NSF), the National Institute of Standards

110	consultation with the Director and the Deputy Director of OFS, shall designate a liaison
111	at their respective agencies to facilitate communication between the OFS, NSF, NIST and
112	CDC respectively.

114	(i) INDEPENDENCE –
115	
116	(1) The Director shall have final authority over all grants, cooperative agreements,
117	and contracts awarded by the Office of Forensic Science.
118	(2) Activities covered by the Office of Forensic Science shall be shielded from
119	inappropriate political and other external or internal influences, and no
120	Department employee, contractor, or detailee shall inappropriately suppress or
121	alter scientific, technological or research findings or condone such activities. All
122	other provisions of the U.S. Department of Justice Scientific and Research
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123	Integrity Policy (July 29, 2013) shall apply.
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125	(j) DUTIES AND AUTHORITY—
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127	(1) IN GENERAL —The Office shall
128	(A) have all those authorities relating to forensic science as those authorities
129	prescribed for the National Institute of Justice in 42 U.S.C. § 3722(c);
130	(B) advise the Attorney General, Deputy Attorney General, and Assistant
131	Attorney General for OJP on forensic science issues;
132	(C) provide assistance to the Deputy Attorney General to facilitate forensic
133	science initiatives;

134	(D) provide oversight of the Department of Justice's Forensic Science
135	Discipline Reviews and Uniform Language for Testimony and Reports;
136	(E) coordinate the federal forensic science research agenda among all
137	departments and agencies of the federal government;
138	(F) assume and execute the responsibilities of the former offices, programs
139	and initiatives designated in II.(a)(1) through (a)(2) of this Act, including the
140	awarding of grants;
141	(G) assist the Forensic Science Board in carrying out all the functions of the
142	Board under this Act and such other related functions as are necessary to
143	perform the functions; and
144	(H) evaluate the recommendations of the Board and take appropriate action.
145	
146	(2) SPECIFIC RESPONSIBILITIES —The Director, in consultation with the
147	Deputy Director, shall—
148	(A) work to ensure that appropriate accreditation, certification, standards,
149	methods, best practices and organizations exist for forensic disciplines.
150	(B) work to secure funding and resources are available to assist forensic
151	science service providers and forensic science practitioners in meeting
152	national and international forensic science standards, methods, best practices,
153	and certification and accreditation requirements;
154	(C) coordinate with and facilitate distribution and implementation of the work
155	products of the National Institute of Standards and Technology's
156	Organization of Scientific Area Committees (OSAC);
157	(D) encourage and support accreditation of all federal, state, local, and tribal
158	forensic science service providers, and certification of forensic science
159	service practitioners and technicians through federal funding of initial and
160	ongoing efforts;
161	(E) generate annual reports by July 1 of each year on the status of federal
162	forensic science research within the government for distribution to the
163	Attorney General, the Senate Judiciary and Commerce, Science, and
164	Transportation Committees, the House Judiciary and Science, Space, and
165	Technology Committees, the National Science Foundation, and the National
166	Institute of Standards and Technology.
167	(F) administer grant programs appropriate to the mission of the Office, to
168	include grant programs for forensic science capacity building, forensic
169	science research, and medicolegal death investigation;
170	(G) generate annual reports by July 1 of each year on the status and needs of
171	the forensic science community, including medicolegal death investigators,
172	medical examiners and coroners, and forensic nurses for distribution to the
173	Attorney General, the Senate Judiciary and Commerce, Science, and
174	Transportation Committees, the House Judiciary and Science, Space, and
175	Technology Committees, the National Science Foundation, and the National
176	Institute of Standards and Technology.
177	(H) act as a spokesperson on behalf of the OFS before the Administration,
178	Congress, and other stakeholder entities;

179	(I) perform all other functions for the Office under this Act and such other
180	related functions as are necessary to perform the functions of the Office
181	described in this Act;
182	(J) interface and liaison with non-federal, public and private forensic science
183	service providers;
184	(K) coordinate with components of the Department of Justice to create and
185	disseminate forensic science primers for federal, state, county, local and
186	Tribal prosecutors;
187	(L) provide assistance for forensic science training within the Department of
188	Justice and state, county, local, and tribal forensic science service providers;
189	(M) provide and maintain sections of USABook and U.S. Attorneys' Manual
190	pertaining to forensic science;
191	(N) fund and host Working Groups to assist the Board in identifying and
192	assessing forensic science technical and operational requirements, and
193	solutions to forensic science practitioner needs;
194	(O) establish and maintain a repository for current and past forensic science
195	research and related materials that have been collected and cataloged to be made
196	available to all interested parties; and
197	(P) establish and maintain a public website for dissemination of information.
198	
199	(3) ADDITIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE DIRECTOR The director
200	shall
201	(A) coordinate and collaborate among other federal agencies related to
202	forensic science policy including the Council of Federal Forensic Laboratory
203	Directors;
204	(B) collaborate among the various private forensic science organizations and
205	associations on policy, and the status and needs of the forensic science
206	community;
207	(C) interface between the Department of Justice and the Forensic Science
208	Board regarding recommendations and reports.
209	
210	(k) BUDGET – there shall be authorized a budget for operations, grants and other initiatives
211	for the OFS which shall include funding in excess of the funding appropriated in the
212	most recent fiscal year for the offices, programs and initiatives designated in II.(a)(1)
213	through (a)(5) of this Act for purposes of staffing, administering and operating the OFS
214	and the Forensic Science Board.

216	III. FORENSIC SCIENCE BOARD
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218	(a) IN GENERAL There is established a Forensic Science Board to serve as an advisory
219	board to the OFS regarding the needs of the forensic science community that will help
220	promote the use of standards and best practices and ensuring consistency, scientific
221	validity, and accuracy with respect to medicolegal death investigations, evidence
222	collection, forensic testing, analysis, identification, and comparisons, the results of
223	which may be interpreted, presented, or otherwise used during the course of a forensic
224	investigation or judicial proceeding.

226	(b) COMPOSITION – The Deputy Attorney General, in consultation with the Assistant
227	Attorney General for OJP and the Director of OFS, shall appoint members to the
228	Forensic Science Board, which shall consist of ten representatives of the forensic
229	science community and two non-voting ex-officio members, as follows:
230	(1) six members shall have at least a bachelor of science degree, with experience as a
231	director or senior manager of an accredited, public, forensic science agency, and have as a forensic science practitioner a primary area of expertise in at least one of

245	different than that of the other five practitioners on the Forensic Science board.
246	(2) one member shall be a board certified forensic pathologist working as a medical
247	examiner or coroner;
248	(3) one member shall be a statistician with experience working as a forensic science
249	practitioner, working in a forensic science agency, or a former or current appointee
250	to OSAC;
251	(4) one member shall be a representative of the Council of Federal Forensic
252	Laboratory Directors; (5) and mamber shall be a SANE Adult/Adalescent or SANE Redigtric certified
253 254	(5) one member shall be a SANE Adult/Adolescent or SANE Pediatric certified forensic nurse or a board certified advance forensic nurse (AFN-BC) who has a least
254 255	a bachelor of science degree, with experience as a director or senior manager of a
255 256	program providing forensic nursing care to patient populations experiencing criminal
257	violence and trauma;
258	(6) one current state, county, or local prosecutor who shall be a non-voting ex officio
259	member;
260	(7) one current criminal defense attorney employed by a state public defender
261	service who shall be a non-voting ex officio member.

263	(c) TERMS —
264	(1) IN GENERAL —A member of the Board shall be appointed for a term of 3
265	years.
266	(2) EXCEPTION —Of the members first appointed to the Board—
267	(A) 3 members shall serve a term of 1 years;
268	(B) 3 members shall serve a term of 2 years; and
269	(C) 4 members shall serve a term of 3 years

272	(3) RENEWABLE TERM —A member of the Board may be appointed for not more
274	than a total of 2 terms, including an initial term described in paragraph (2) of this

277	(d) DUTIES OF FORENSIC SCIENCE BOARD –
278	(1) the Forensic Science Board shall –
279	(A) provide input to the OFS concerning the support of federal, state, county,
280	local and tribal forensic science service providers and stakeholders regarding
281	the needs of the forensic community and other matters;
282	(B) make recommendations to the Director of OFS relating to federal
283	research priorities and needs, and any other issue consistent with this Act;
284	(C) promote and support —
285	(i) accreditation, certification, and research programs and procedures
286	established under this Act; and
287	(ii) the use of national and international standards and best practices
288	by forensic science service providers; and
289	(iii) review and update, as appropriate, any recommendations made
290	under paragraph III.(d)(1); and
291	(iv) perform all other functions of the Board under this Act and such
291	other related functions as are necessary to perform the functions of
292	the Board.
294	(2) the Forensic Science Board may form subcommittees and task groups of
295	individuals on the Board and members invited by the Board to participate;
296	(3) the Forensic Science Board shall meet in-person at least twice a year, providing
297	funds are available;
298	(4) the Forensic Science Board shall also meet with or otherwise communicate with
299	the Council of Federal Forensic Laboratory Directors and Department of Justice
300	laboratory directors.
301	
302	(e) APPLICABILITY OF THE FEDERAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE ACT —
303	(1) IN GENERAL —Subject to paragraphs (2) and (3), the Federal Advisory
304	Committee Act (5 U.S.C. App.) shall apply to the Forensic Science Board.
305	(2) TERMINATION PROVISION —Section 14(a)(2) of the Federal Advisory
306	Committee Act (5 U.S.C. App.) shall not apply to the Forensic Science Board.
307	(3) COMPENSATION OF MEMBERS — Members of the Forensic Science Board
308	shall serve without compensation for services performed for the Board.
309	(4) TRAVEL EXPENSES —The members of the Forensic Science Board shall be
310	allowed travel expenses, including per diem in lieu of subsistence, at rates authorized
311	for employees of agencies under subchapter I of chapter 57 of title 5, United States
312	Code, while away from their homes or regular places of business in the performance
313	of services for the Board.

314	(5) DESIGNATED FEDERAL OFFICER —In accordance with the Federal
315	Advisory Committee Act (5 U.S.C. App.), the Director shall—
316	(A) serve as the designated Federal officer; and
317	(B) designate a committee management officer for the Forensic Science
318	Board.

320	IV. GRANT PROGRAMS
321	
322	A. GRANT PROGRAMS—The grant programs under this Act, shall include, but
323	not limited to:
324	(1) forensic science research, basic and applied; development, testing, and
325	evaluation;
326	(2) capacity building, including office accreditation and personnel certification;
327	(3) forensic science education, training, and technical assistance;
328	(4) support for databases, automation and information systems, electronic
329	networking, and information sharing;
330	(5) studies on the ethical, legal, and social implications of forensic science; and
331	(6) targeted programs, to include, but not limited to:
332	(a) sexual assaults,
333	(b) drug abuse,
334	(c) medicolegal death investigation,
335	(d) missing and unidentified persons,
336	(e) digital and multimedia evidence, and
337	(f) forensic intelligence.
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
